-MEETING AGENDA -

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 8:38 am.



II. ROLL CALL AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mary Snow was absent and excused and Carmen Manrara-Cartaya was absent. All other members were in attendance and a quorum was present. Ariel Fernandez made a motion to approve the March meeting minutes; the motion was seconded by Theresa Rice and passed unanimously.

III. ONGOING BUSINESS

- a. Update on General Obligation Bond for the 10 Coral Gables Schools
 - Mr. Cabanas explained that a general obligation bond was passed in 2011 for 1.2 billion this money would be used to renovate facilities, update technology, building replacements for schools as well as expanding and enhancing the size and safety of schools. Mr. Cabanas also explained the MDCPS used the pie methodology where each school would get a piece of the pie to fix the needs of that school. He also explained that the district is midway through dispersing funds. Mr. Cabanas explained what the phases of each stage of completion of a project means. As an attachment to these minutes the presentation Mr. Cabanas distributed is available.

b. School Safety & Security Update

 Mari-Tere Rojas began the discussion by first explaining that safety and security has always been a major priority even prior to the incident at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High school. Mrs. Rojas explained the



entrance procedures and policies for identifying individuals who are not members of that school. She reassured the committee that immediate steps have been taken to put a lot of importance on surveillance and cameras. Mari-Tere also explained that all staff, police and students are receiving special training on how to deal with different types of incidents. The overall desire is for the MDCPS police to work in conjunction with local municipality police forces. Sam explained that the 97 million allocated for school safety state wide is not enough to help solve the problem. On average in order to put a School Resource Office (SRO) in each of the 380 schools district wide it would cost 40 million just for MDCPS. Sam explained that this is why he feels it is so important for municipalities like the City of Coral Gables to help actively police schools in their areas.

- c. 2018 Florida Legislative Wrap-up of Miami-Dade County Public Schools
 - Ms. Eva Regueira began with the update discussing SB 7026 which increases the money allocated for safe schools. She explained that about 10 million will be coming to MDC which will allow the school to hire new officers. SB 7026 makes it law for schools to have a police officer at each school. The county is working to maximize the time of current officer also ways to cut down on the hiring time it takes to get a school resource officers hired. Ms. Regueira also touched on the Coach Aaron Fels Guardian program which was formally known as the Marshall program which allows school to arm school employees. Most of the school districts in the state are against the arming of school employees. Sam explained to the board that if MDCPS opts out of any part of these plans they will receive zero state funding. Mari-Tere explained that MDCPS is working with the state legislation to make these requirements more flexible. The portion of the presentation that pertains to this section of the meeting minutes is available as an attachment.

IV. NEW BUSINESS

- a. SCRC Schools Perception Versus Reality
 - Sam opened up the conversation welcoming Mr. Perez to the conversation and explaining that although the SCRC covers 11 schools there are 4 schools that the committee often hears conflicting information about. The first school reviewed Frances S. Tucker Elementary which has environmental sciences magnet, which has been an A school although it has and historically lower enrollment than other area schools. Sam explained that there are no schools lower than t a B within the City of Coral Gables City limits. Tucker Elementary has a piano lab as we as a beautiful butterfly garden. Both Carver Elementary and ISPA have great language program and desirous of expanding these programs. Also Ponce De Leon Middle School has a great Pre-IB program which includes Spanish, Italian, and a cooking program. Ponce De Leon also offers an 8th grade dual enrollment program. Coral Gables Senior High has 3,300 students and about 465 students in the IB program.
