An Ordinance providing for the levy of taxes for the Fiscal Year beginning October 1, 2016 and ending September 30, 2017; fixing the rate of such levy; providing for the segregation and the application of the proceeds of such levy; providing for the separability of the provisions hereof; and providing that this ordinance shall become effective October 1, 2016. (Passed on First Reading on September 13, 2016).

Mayor Cason: So, let's move on to Item number 3. Do we have a motion? This is the ordinance.

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Commissioner Keon: I'll make a motion.

City Attorney Leen: And this is the item that is the taxes and the millage rate. This is the item

that requires a vote of four.

Mayor Cason: So, Commissioner Keon made the motion. Commissioner Lago second. City

Clerk.

Commissioner Slesnick: Discussion.

Mayor Cason: You want to discuss?

Commissioner Slesnick: I just want to say something. Just back to the sculpture and so forth

about money being spent in the City of Coral Gables. Commissioner Keon and I both attended

the meeting last Saturday at different times.

Commissioner Keon: It was noticed anyway.

Commissioner Slesnick: So, I just wanted to say one thing that came out of the discussion is that

the citizens of Coral Gables really would like to hear more about what's going on in the City and

they question how they can find out more. Of course, I stressed e-News and so forth and about

our page in the Miami Herald. Because when this discussion came up, whenever it was, 2013 or

whatever, I believe about three-fourths or four-fifths of the meetings that were held were held

with the former City Manager and Cindy Birdsill, our Economic Development Director at the

time, because I live in the neighborhood and everybody that lives in the neighborhood that came

to the meeting on Saturday and nobody had heard anything about it until it actually was

performed. And so, when we're spending a million dollars of the City's money, whether it be

from taxes on the homes or from permits and so forth, I really feel we need to be more

transparent and no matter what we spend, but especially anything over \$100,000 so that the

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residents are informed as best we can. Now, if we don't -- if they don't get the Herald and they

don't read it and they don't read the e-News, that's their problem. But they're looking for a way

to hear more about what's going on in the community and they want that information. So, if we

could, as a body, and our City Manager, think of more ways to inform our citizens, even though

they -- we had 43 meetings -- most of us had not even heard about any meetings. And I know

you can send out postcards and other things, but there's -- there must be some way of informing

the citizens of Coral Gables how we're appropriating our money and spending their tax dollars.

Mayor Cason: I'm happy that -- in the first budget meeting no one showed up, and this has been

a tendency in the last five years.

Commissioner Slesnick: I know we've had...

Mayor Cason: No one in the audience. So, I mean, part of it is, we've been discussing this for a

long time. We've gone to social media. We got your newspaper every week. We've got Coral

Gables Television. We've got...

Commissioner Lago: We've got the Coral Gables app.

Mayor Cason: Expanding the notification period, but people have to want to know and have to

be engaged and follow what's going on...

Commissioner Slesnick: Yes.

Mayor Cason: Because everything that we do here is televised and can be found.

Commissioner Slesnick: And there are -- but again, when this happened, we did not have any of

those things in place and ads were being put in the Miami Business Review and not in the

Herald.

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Commissioner Keon: But we do use the Miami Business Review for notice.

Commissioner Slesnick: No, no. No, I meant when the -- when this was passed -- when that was

passed. But again, if there's any way that we could expose the public more -- and I do know that

just by promoting the City e-News in various locations, like at the farmer's market and so forth,

we have 2 or 3,000 more people on the City e-News now...

City Manager Swanson-Rivenbark: Yes.

Commissioner Slesnick: Than we did so...

Commissioner Lago: But, I mean, Commissioner, I understand. I respect your comments as

always, but I mean, we -- I take -- I think as a Commission as a whole, we take great pride in

being the most transparent city in Dade County. I mean, there -- I speak to a lot of other

Commissioners of the League of Cities as your representative, and they come up to me and tell

me, you guys do an incredible job notifying the residents. When you talk about notifications in

reference to proposed development projects, we go to an extent that no other city does, five times

the span in reference to the notifications. Usually, it's about 250 feet. In some cases, we're at a

thousand and now fifteen hundred square feet from the project.

Commissioner Slesnick: And I hear you.

Commissioner Lago: You know, we're doing -- we're online. We have an app. We are doing --

we buy a page in the neighborhood -- a full page in Neighbors every single week. We have the

gentleman from Miami Herald at all our meetings who writes incredibly effective articles -- and

I'm not pandering...

Commissioner Slesnick: He does.

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Commissioner Lago: To him, but I mean, he does cover us.

Commissioner Slesnick: Thank you, Lance.

Commissioner Lago: I mean, the only thing we can do is maybe rent a skywriter and put this

on...

Commissioner Slesnick: I'm just talking about from the past.

Commissioner Lago: Maybe on some sort of -- maybe rent a skywriter and maybe rent like a

giant billboard on Bird Road and we'll...

Mayor Cason: If anybody has any ideas of other ways, let us know.

Commissioner Lago: We can't beg you to show up to these meetings. We have done everything

in our power. Look, I hold -- and the last Commissioner to do this was you and myself, and all

of you have come -- Commissioner Kerdyk used to do it 15 years ago. I've been holding city...

Commissioner Slesnick: Town hall meetings.

Commissioner Lago: Town hall meetings over the last three years twice a year. I hold them in

the first quarter and in the last quarter. I'm going to have another one in November. I spend my

own money, over \$3,000 last year...

Commissioner Slesnick: I spend my own money, too.

Commissioner Lago: Last year, I spent over \$3,000 mailing out -- because the Commissioners

have no budgets, no budget to send out a simple mailer to the residents -- because they think

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we're doing propaganda for ourselves -- to basically have a forum where all of staff who doesn't

receive any overtime pay, attend these meetings and listens to all the residents and basically

tackles any topic that you like. I understand what you're saying and I agree with you

wholeheartedly. My comments are more based out of frustration that I don't think we can do

anything else.

Commissioner Slesnick: I'm just saying the citizens of Coral Gables live in Coral Gables

because they love Coral Gables and I don't want to be compared to any other city in Dade

County because there's no other better city than Coral Gables.

Commissioner Lago: But that's why we go head and shoulders above any other municipality.

Mayor Cason: Let's put it this way. If anybody either watching the television...

Commissioner Slesnick: We need suggestions.

Mayor Cason: And has some ideas, give us some suggestions...

Commissioner Lago: Listen, as a matter of fact...

Mayor Cason: (INAUDIBLE) come up with any...

Commissioner Lago: Let me interject. Let me speak to the best clerk in Miami-Dade County.

Mr. Clerk, didn't you implement a software that allows individuals who are listening right now

who can't make the meetings write in and basically become part of the meeting?

City Clerk Foeman: Yes.

Commissioner Lago: Who was the first city to implement that?

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City Clerk Foeman: We were the first city in Dade County.

Mayor Cason: And let me ask you as a follow-up question...

Commissioner Slesnick: Are we the only city?

Mayor Cason: Has anyone used it?

City Clerk Foeman: No.

Commissioner Lago: Has anyone used it? So let me...

Mayor Cason: There's your answer. I rest my case.

Commissioner Lago: So let me explain to you. If you were at home right now and you can't make it to the meeting, you could log on to the computer and be just like the three people who spoke before us and verbally interject and state what is on your mind in reference to whatever topic we're dealing with and it will be memorialized and you will have your moment in the sun and you will be dealt with and your questions will be answered, and nobody's used it. How much -- let's talk about money, I'm sorry. How much are we spending on that program on a

yearly basis, to be transparent, to be excessively transparent?

City Clerk Foeman: Five hundred dollars a month.

Commissioner Lago: Five hundred dollars a month. And how long have we been using it?

City Clerk Foeman: This past year.

Commissioner Lago: There is no other municipality in Dade County to do this, and we're doing

this for our residents. And we allow you -- and we implore you, you want to get involved in the

City of Coral Gables, like Commissioner Slesnick says, we don't have any other idea. We've

run out of ideas. We're doing -- we're using programs that nobody else uses.

Mayor Cason: And let's -- and with this as well, I don't know about you, but I probably had -- I

think the last count was 18,000 emails.

Commissioner Lago: Yeah.

Mayor Cason: We all get emails. Our doors are open. We're here.

Commissioner Lago: We respond to them personally.

Mayor Cason: Everything we do here is televised and we can go back and find any portion of

any discussion back for years. So -- but what we find is every meeting somebody will come and

say I didn't know, I didn't know. And -- but take a look at how many people out of our 31,000

registered voters vote.

Commissioner Lago: And we haven't even mentioned -- I'm sorry to interrupt you, Mayor. We

haven't even mentioned what the Manager implemented when she came on board. She's

implemented a quarterly newsletter that never existed before, where you learn about what's

going on in the city, what issues are going on, what events are going on, and you have a half-

page dedicated to every Commissioner and the Mayor in reference to topics that we want to

discuss. So, I mean, if I'm missing an opportunity, I implore you to please call in. You can

contact us here and give us an idea.

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Mayor Cason: So, to close this discussion, any more suggestions, please let us know. We'll --

we entertain any suggestion how to better inform our citizens about the -- and our meetings go

on 11 hours. We're discussing many, many things, so...

Commissioner Keon: We did have a young couple that did make a suggestion, and we've been

talking to Peter about it, and he is going to talk to IT whether it can work or not. And if it works

out, we'll come back and IT will tell us about it, so...

Mayor Cason: But let's ask...

Commissioner Keon: Thank them.

Mayor Cason: We have -- let's move back to Item 2 (sic). We have a motion and a second.

Commissioner Keon: Yes.

Commissioner Lago: Yes.

Mayor Cason: Yes.

Commissioner Slesnick: Yes.
