## **BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS**

## **Three Appropriation Projects Funded**

The Canal Dredging project was funded at \$300,000 on the water project list this year and the Comprehensive I & I Program also received \$100,000. The Sidewalk Construction on Collector Streets Project was funded at \$300,000. The General Appropriations Act that passed this session also fully funded the state's affordable housing programs at \$370 million and included \$52.5 million in additional money for responding to COVID-19 with another \$300 million in contingency funds.

## PRIORITY BILLS

HB 459/ SB 954 Building Design: These bills, filed by Representative Overdorf and Senator Perry, would have prohibited the local regulation of building design elements of one or two family dwellings unless certain criteria are met. The bill defined "design elements" broadly, including exterior color, cladding, roofs, porches, ornamentation, windows and doors, as well as the number, type, and layout of interior rooms. While the House version did pass this year, we were successful in keeping the Senate version from moving forward.

SB 1302 Sovereign Immunity: This bill would have designated the "Florida Fair Claims Act", increasing the statutory limits on liability for tort claims against the state/agencies/subdivisions and revising when a state/agencies/subdivision may agree to settle a claim or judgment without further legislative action.

HB 1149/SB 1702 Local Government Fiscal Transparency: Filed by Representative DiCeglie and Senator Diaz, this bill would have required a number of actions by local governments in an effort to increase fiscal transparency including requiring the posting voting record information on websites, the posting of property tax information and history, and public notices for hearings and meetings before new tax increases. It would also have required local governments to conduct debt affordability analyses and provide a mechanism for posting that information. While the House version of this bill passed, the Senate version was never considered in committee.

HB7047 Tax Package: On the last day of session, significant negotiations took place between the House and Senate regarding the scope of the proposed tax package, in large part due to the uncertainty surrounding the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and a desire to give as much flexibility as possible to future legislatures. After growing to \$230 million at one point, ultimately many of the recurring aspects were removed and the total of the final tax package was \$47.4 million. The only items included in the final bill will a fiscal impact were a three day back to school holiday and a seven day disaster holiday.

HB 47/SB 114 Risk Protection Orders: Filed by Representative Stark and Senate Berman, these bills would have re-defined the term "petitioner" to include an individual who has a biological or legal parent-child relationship with, who is a legal guardian of, or who is a spouse or sibling of a respondent and allow those individuals to seek a risk protection order. Unfortunately, these bills failed to gain traction this year and did not move forward.

## PRIORITY BILLS CONTINUED

HB 203/SB410 Growth Management: This bill bounced back and forth between the two chambers multiple times in the final days of session and several amendments were added. The final bill stipulates that a county may not adopt, after January 1, 2020, any comprehensive plan, land development regulation, or other form of restriction that serves as a limitation on a municipality from establishing land use and zoning on lands located within a municipality unless through its own ordinances a municipality adopts and imposes the provision on lands located within their jurisdiction. A county also may not limit a municipality from deciding the land uses, density, and intensity allowed on lands annexed into a municipality as long as they are in compliance with statute. The subsection does not apply to a charter county with a population in excess of 750,000 which has in place charter provisions governing land use or development where provisions apply to all jurisdictions within the county. The bill also made changes to s. 163.3168 Planning innovations and technical assistance relating to the selection of applications for funding for technical assistance and giving preference to smaller counties. A number of stakeholder groups have expressed concerns with this bill and specifically with some of the amendments that were added in the final days and are encouraging Governor. DeSantis to veto this legislation when he receives it.

HB 6043/SB 182 Preemption of Recyclable and Polystyrene: These bills did not move forward this year, however the bill prohibiting local governments from banning products like sunscreens with certain chemicals did pass after significant debate. This bill will now be sent to the Governor for his signature or veto. While he did veto the plastic straw bill last year, he allowed several similar bills to become law so his decision on this legislation will provide insight as we consider how to advocate for efforts like Senator Stewart's bill next session.

HB 1011/SB 1128 Vacation Rentals: These bill would have clarified the scope of the state's preemption of vacation rentals while leaving in-tact those ordinances or regulations adopted before June 1, 2011. The language did allow for local regulations which apply uniformly to all residential properties without regard to whether or not that property is a vacation rental and specified that the bill did not supersede the statutory authority of condominiums, cooperatives, or homeowners' associations to govern property use. This bill was not heard in its final Senate committee and was temporarily postponed in the House and not taken back up for a final vote.

Local Government Public Construction Works: Revising disclosure requirements for bidding documents and other requests for proposals issued for bids by a local governmental entity and public contracts entered into between local governmental entities and contractors; requiring that a local government that performs projects using its own services, employees, and equipment provide a report to the local governing board with certain information, etc. Effective Date: July 1, 2020

Environmental Regulation: Specifies requirements for contracts between residential recycling collectors or recovered materials processing facilities & counties or municipalities for collecting, transporting, & processing residential recycling material & contaminated recyclable material; prohibits local governments from requiring further verification from DEP for certain projects; revises types of dock & pier replacements & repairs that are exempt from such verification & certain permitting requirements. Effective Date: July 1, 2020

TITLE **Housing Discrimination** 

Removes housing discrimination as cause of action for relief & damages stemming from violations of Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992; revises timeframe & conditions under which aggrieved person may commence civil action to enforce specified rights; authorizes, rather than requires, civil action after alleged discriminatory housing practice; authorizes civil action regardless of certain circumstances; prohibits aggrieved person from filing specified action in certain circumstances; provides exception. Effective Date: upon becoming a law.
